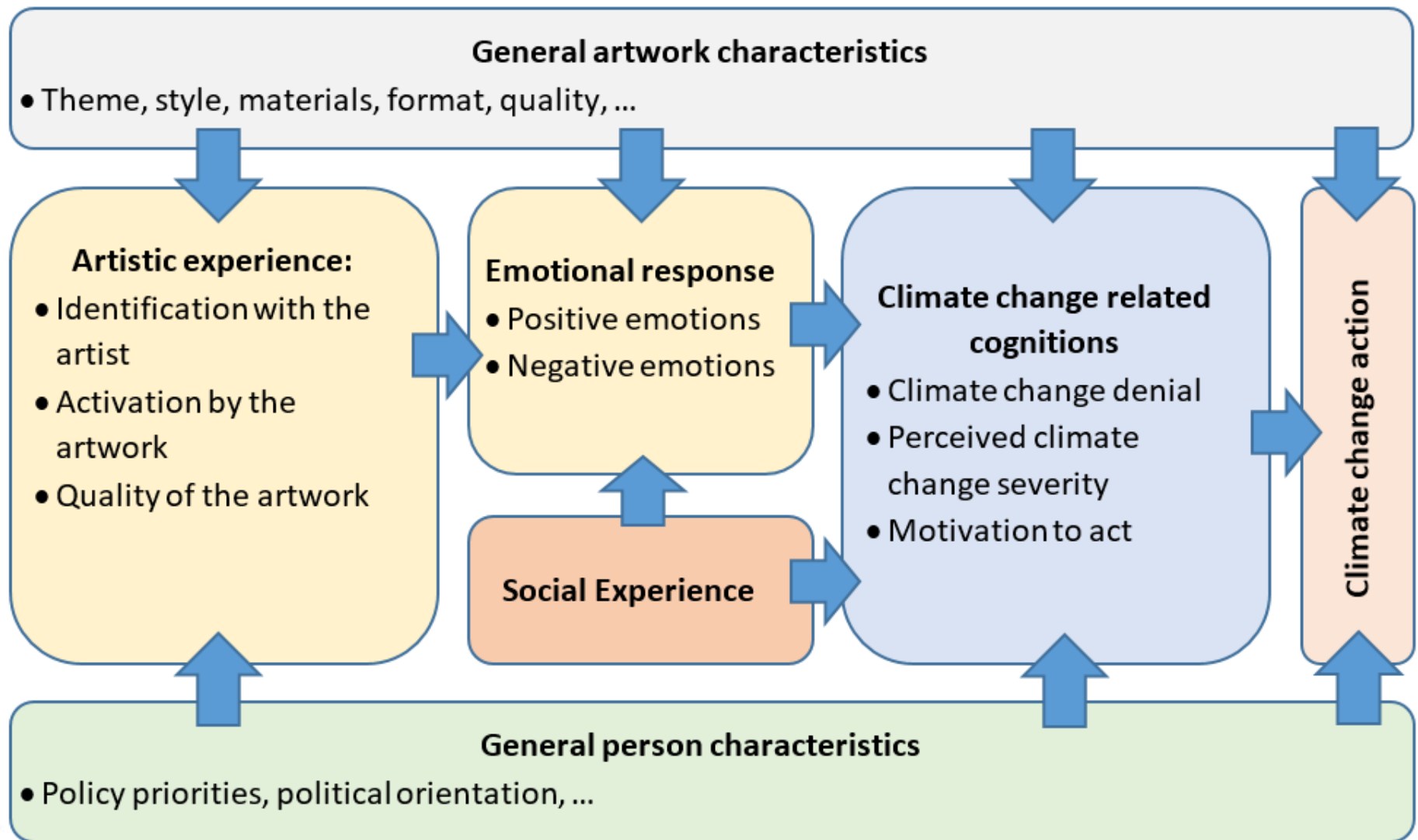

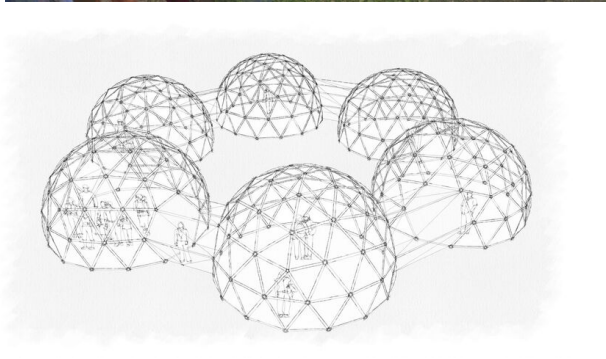
Climate Change communication and Art

- Climate Change communication so far
 - Scientific reports / documentaries / «facts»
 - Disconnection in space & time
 - Lack of identification / lack of emotional connection / lack of action / lack of personal narratives?
- Artists have responded to climate change
 - Cape Farewell (UK)
 - CLIMARTE: ART+CLIMATE=CHANGE (AUS)
- Maybe climate related art has a different effect on people?
 - Individual narratives
 - Emotional reactions
 - Moments of disruption and reflection
 - Drivers / catalysts of societal change



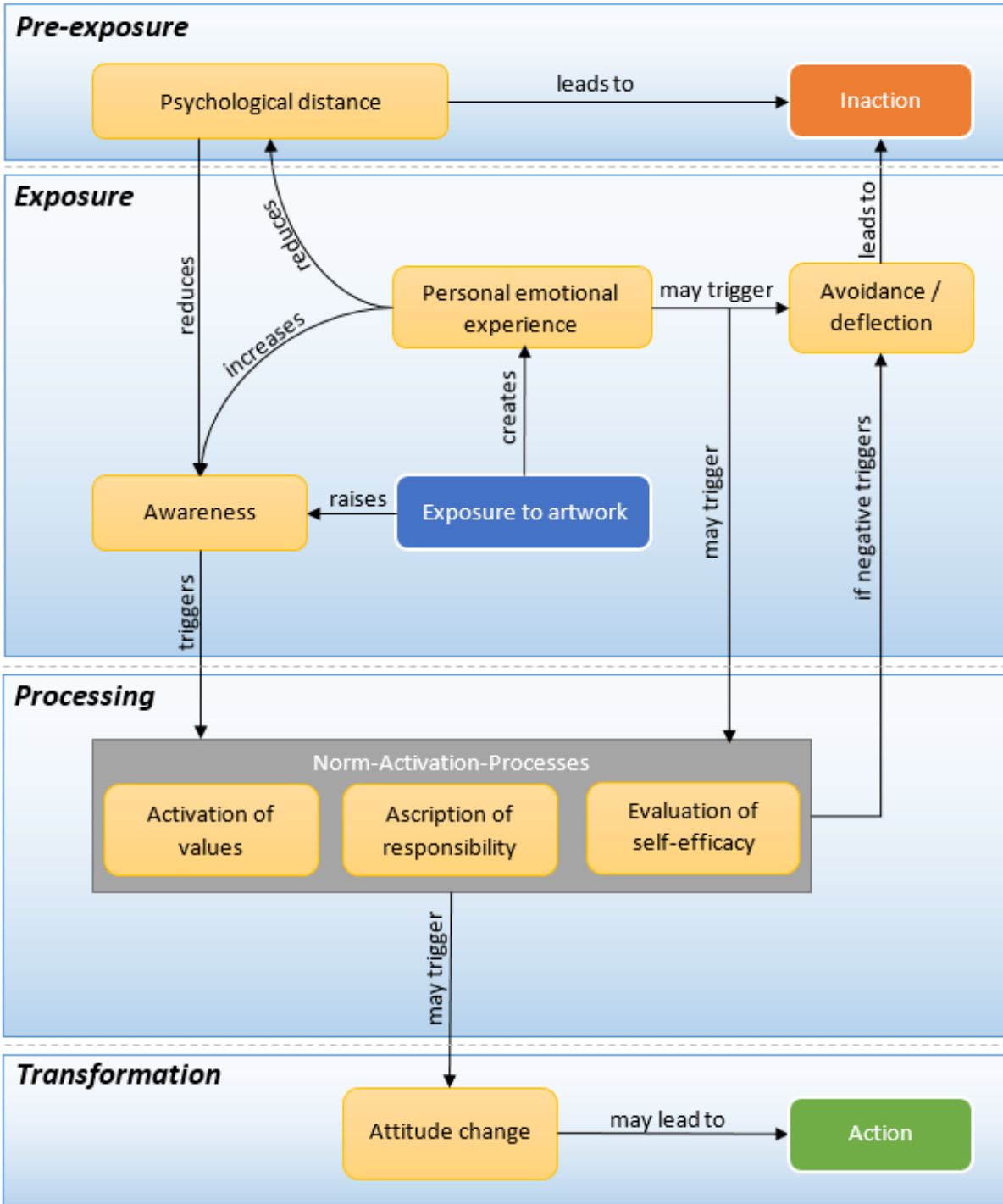


The pollution pods by Michael Pinsky
